Voting Rules

You *must* read this if you are a

Member of Animalzania!

There are two ways for voting:

- (1) you call on the phone or
- (2) you mail in ballots.

If you wish to vote by phone, this is how you do it:

- (1) you call (559) 891- 1823 and say your name and that you would like to vote.
- (2) The person you are talking to will ask how many stuffed animals you have and ask who each animal wishes to vote for. Each animal may vote only once (rules have changed).
- (3) After voting, you hang up the phone and are done.

If you wish to vote by mail this is how you do it:

> (1) you cut out slips of paper which will serve as the ballots.



(2) You then have each stuffed animal vote in this format:

Stuffed Animal's Name

Person he is voting for

- (3) you then fold each ballot in half and when voting is completed, you count each ballot and write down the results.
- (4) Next you send the *results* and the ballots – only if you wish to – to 2315 Sequoia Street, Selma, CA 93662. (5) If you are *not* a member, your votes will be immediately discarded because only Members of Animalzania can vote.


Far off in the woods on the opposite side, he saw the friendly glow of a lamp, and the kneeling figure of his commander, praying in the snow.


As he stumbled back to his tent, the figure of the General came up to him. "I am glad you have decided to remain at your post, Matthew," he said as he passed him. "Good night."
